September is National Suicide Prevention Awareness Month If you or someone you know is in an emergency, call The National Suicide Prevention Lifeline at 800-273-TALK (8255) or call 911 immediately. If you're uncomfortable talking on the phone, you can also text NAMI to 741-741 to be connected to a free, trained crisis counselor on the Crisis Text Line. Suicidal thoughts, much like mental health conditions, can affect anyone regardless of age, gender or background. In fact, suicide is often the result of an untreated mental health condition. Suicidal thoughts, although common, should not be considered normal and often indicate more serious issues. Every year thousands of individuals die by suicide, leaving behind their friends and families affected by a suicide loss (often called "suicide loss survivors") are left in the dark. Voters who receive handwritten mailings are significantly more likely to vote, which helps counter voter suppression. We'll help you send letters targeting traditionally under-represented voters in Michigan or other states, and you'll tell them why voting is important to you. (This is very effective!) To join this effort, you can either go right to votefwd.org and follow the directions, or contact Nancy Dawn Van Beest for assistance. When you've addressed and sealed all your envelopes, let Nancy Dawn know so she can add the postage and hold them for the big "send date" in October. (It's important not to send them earlier.) Guidelines for Small Group Gatherings on 3rd Street Property

1. All youth aged K-12 are welcome to use the tent with a parent or guardian present.

2. Use of the tent is limited to parties of 10 or less.

3. Do not come if you feel sick (e.g., fever, cough, shortness of breath, etc.)

4. Masks must be worn at all times and must cover your nose and mouth.

5. Maintain social distance (min. 6 feet)

6. Do not consume food and drinks under the tent (as these will require you to remove your mask.)

7. Bring your own chair.

8. Regarding trash, if you bring it in, take it out.

9. Please note that the church building remains closed to everyone except UUSG staff. (Bathroom facilities will be unavailable.)
