Recycling Campaign Signs: Campaign signs are a recycling challenge because they are made from multiple materials such as paper, plastic, and metal. Disposing of them requires taking them apart and disposing of each portion based on its material. Here's what you can do:

- Breakdown the sign by detaching the metal wire stand from the sign.
 The metal wire is made of steel. Steel wire isn't recycled curbside, but it can be recycled with other scrap metal.
- If the sign is paper, it can be recycled curbside.
- If the sign is sturdy corrugated plastic, that means it is made from plastic #5. Plastic #5 can be recycled curbside.
- If the sign is a thin flexible plastic, it is made from plastic #2 or #4. This can't be recycled curbside, but can be recycled with plastic bags.

Before tossing your campaign sign, consider saving it for future use. You could attach a new message to the board and use it to promote a special event. A local non-profit organization or school may be able to use the sign, too.

How do we combat the injustices in our country? Stand up for others? Use our voices to speak for those unable to do so? In the words of Nelson Mandela, "Education is the most powerful weapon which you can use to change the world." To that end, Religious Education has collected several antiracism books for the UUSG library. From child and teen to adult audiences, the UUSG library has a nice selection of new titles to share. Books are available in a bin on the front porch of the Pioneer House. Please sign out the books you borrow on the log on the clipboard. Try to return the books within a month to give others the chance to read as well. May you find inspiration and hope throughout the pages.
