Today's story reflects that of Pentecost, in that it is about language and comprehension. Just as the Holy Spirit filled the Apostles and gave them the ability to make sense of nonsense, "Du Iz Tak?" invites you to listen carefully, discerning inflection and visual information to understand what, on the surface, seems unintelligible. Using a story about the cycle of life, this book inventively reminds us to listen carefully so that everyone can be heard and to imagine the dramatic possibilities of two immense sources: communication and nature. May "Beyond Our Walls" This month's BOW offering is for Lazarus House Homeless Shelter, which is both an Emergency Shelter and a Center for Transitional Living located in St. Charles. Serving as an Emergency shelter involves being open 24 hours on Monday through Saturday and 16 hours on Sunday. They make available 3 meals a day, shower and laundry facilities, and personal hygiene items. The Center for Transitional Living provides individual rooms as well as space for families to stay together. The staff creates case management plans with the goal of helping their guests attain permanent independence. In addition, Lazarus House has arranged for health care, tutoring, haircuts, credit counseling, employment services, and more. Please contact socialjusticeleader@uusg.org to find out how you can volunteer to prepare meals or stay overnight to assist their staff. This month's donations will be split evenly, one-half goes to UUSG's fund for reimbursing our meal providers and one-half goes directly to Lazarus House programs.

HR40 Commission to Study and Develop Reparation Proposals for African Americans Act Urge your Congressional Representative to vote for HR40. Find contact information here. This bill establishes the Commission to Study and Develop Reparation Proposals for African Americans. The commission shall examine slavery and discrimination in the colonies and the United States from 1619 to the present and recommend appropriate remedies.

The commission shall identify (1) the role of the federal and state governments in supporting the institution of slavery, (2) forms of discrimination in the public and private sectors against freed slaves and their descendants, and (3) lingering negative effects of slavery on living African Americans and society.
