From the Minister's Desk

In 1842, the Founders of our church wrote <u>a covenant</u> into their church ledger, a covenant that has been part of our shared worship ever since. It closes by calling us "seekers after truth and goodness". Seekers. Not necessarily *finders*, but seekers. Like we're on a noble quest! That's fun.

180 years is a *long* time to be on a quest. But even so, it is a remarkable course that we've charted – one church, many spiritual paths, united in a quest for truth and practical goodness. Our Founders would be delighted, I imagine, to know that our sanctuary was once their sanctuary, that our gatherings look like their gatherings, that our religious ideals were theirs, too. It's inspiring.

Yes, things have changed a bit. I suspect our beautifully painted windows and our reclaimed pews and our one-of-a-kind chalice -- and our new Internet capacities – all of that would probably have raised the excessively bushy eyebrows of some in that early group. Just as the abolition of slavery, the rise of industry, the urban transformation of our region, two World Wars, and two vast pandemics, all of *that* would have raised eyebrows, too.

Our church has been through a lot. Seen a lot. Contraction. Expansion. Change.

But through it all, we have kept their faith just as we have kept their covenant. Our covenant. It lives on in us here, and in the children formed here, and it will continue to live on in those who will follow us, long after we are all gone.

Our church was once a big bet. One that, 180 years later, is still paying dividends. That initial investment of time, talent, and treasure in the 1840s has carried all of us forward. I can only wonder where our church will be 180 years from now. I will say, though, that whatever that future looks like, it is my hope that our church will remain that place where people of all histories, all backgrounds, all identities, will find home, and comfort, and community. Where "they", whoever "they" are, can be seekers after truth and goodness, too. And maybe, in their seeking, in their pursuing, maybe they will find some of the happiness that comes with the questing and the questioning, the same happiness that people have always found here. The same happiness that we have always found, here, in our community.

That happiness is created every day through your gifts of love and support. And it is your generosity that makes our little church into a gift. A gift to yourselves, yes. To your families, sure. A gift to your friends and neighbors, most definitely.

And mostly, UUSG is your gift to those who have yet to walk through our real (and virtual!) doors, but might, sometime in the next 180 years and more.

UUSG is your gift to their future.

New Spring Schedule for Religious Education

Effective Sunday, April 2, 2023 a new Sunday morning schedule will go into effect. The teachers proposed the idea and the parents voiced agreement. Many thanks to all who answered my questionnaire.

Religious Education (RE) will no longer be held before church at 9:30. The new time for RE will be 10:30, to coincide with the church service.

Details

- Details of whether any of the K-12 youth will be in the sanctuary for any part of church are being worked on.
- What I know now is we will ALL be together in community every month on the second Sunday.
- Now taking place on the second (not fourth) Sunday, please join us for the social justice project prior to the intergenerational service.
- The intergenerational service will take the place of RE class once a month.
- Our youth will be encouraged, coerced, bribed...to participate as greeters, basket passers, worship associates, story presenters and musicians. If you have any other requests or ideas, please let me know!

As a reminder, social justice Sundays are designed for the entire congregation. Regardless of whether you have kids, you are welcome and encouraged to join us! Please mark your calendars for 9:30 am on these remaining dates in the 22-23 school year:

March 26 (final 4th Sunday) April 9 (Easter) May 14 (Mother's Day)

Parents, stay tuned for further details. I hope this shift makes your Sunday mornings easier. This will be a good pilot to determine class timing for the 23-24 school year.



Time Traveling with the Heritage Team

Did you know that an Emergency Food Pantry was started in 1981 by the Rev. Dr. Lindsay Bates? It was open 4 days a week and served about 23 clients weekly in its first year. By the second year, 600 families were fed weekly.

The Pantry began as a single shelf of food that was available to people in need and was housed in Pioneer House. In the beginning it was run with help from St John Neumann Catholic Church and many, many volunteers. Later, the Geneva Methodist and Baker Memorial Methodist Churches would also become involved. By 1992, it was known as the Geneva Interfaith Food Pantry and it was available to the hungry from DuPage and Kane Counties.

The Pantry closed in the spring of 1993 with much of their work being carried on by the St. Charles Salvation Army.





Our UUSG Book Club will be reading *The Nickel Boys* by Colson Whitehead at our next meeting on March 9th at 7 p.m. in the Common Room. This timely book was published in 2019 and won the 2020 Pulitzer Prize. The Nickel Boys continues our interest in reading about the Native American traditions and history in the United States. The book is historical fiction but based on a true story "of two boys unjustly sentenced to a hellish reform school in Jim Crow-era Florida."

When Elwood Curtis, a black boy growing up in 1960s Tallahassee, is unfairly sentenced to a juvenile reformatory called the Nickel Academy, he finds himself trapped in a grotesque chamber of horrors. Elwood's only salvation is his friendship with fellow delinquent Turner... As life at the Academy becomes ever more perilous, the tension between Elwood's ideals and Turner's skepticism leads to a decision whose repercussions will echo down the decades.

Based on the *real story* of a reform school that operated for 111 years and warped the lives of thousands of children, *The Nickel Boys* is a devastating, driven narrative that showcases a great American novelist writing at the height of his powers..." (*Entertainment Weekly*). Whitehead is also the author of the hit novel, *The Underground Railroad*.




Oneness Drum Circle - 1st Sunday of the Month Beginning Sunday, March 5, 2-4pm in the Common Room
